Wolves' Mid-season Transfer Breakdown

In our previous edition of the newsletter at the end of last season we gave a breakdown of all the transfer dealings made in the pre-season transfer window by Wolves following the appointment of our new head coach Nuno Espirito Santo. All in all there were eleven arrivals, most of which have played a significant part in our unbelievable start to the season.

When the transfer window reopened on the 1st January Nuno made minimal changes to the squad, this was with a view of only bringing in players who would benefit the team in that final push towards promotion to the Premier League. All the details of the major additions and departures are detailed below.



Alfred N'Diaye 31st August 2017

The Villareal midfielder signed on a season long loan deal on the last day of the August pre-season transfer window. Alfred is a versatile performer who can play in the centre of defence as well as in midfield.

The Senegal international has had previous experience of English football, having had loan spells with Hull and Sunderland when both were in the Premier League. He made 15 appearances for Hull over the second half of last season, scoring one goal on his debut against Liverpool.

Alfred also boasts La Liga experience with Real Betis, for whom he played prior to joining Villareal in the summer of 2016.



Rafa Mir 3rd January 2018

The 20-year old forward signed on a four and a half year deal from La Liga side Valencia, with the fee estimated to be in the region of £2 million.

As well as Valencia, Rafa's former clubs include Real Murcia, Barcelona, Ranero and ElPozo Murcia. The young forward has previously worked with Head Coach Nuno Espirito Santo during his time with Valencia, and explained that Nuno played a big part in his Molineux move.

Rafa has been handed the 'number 9' shirt for the remainder of the season, he follows in the footsteps of two former Wolves legends who have previously worn the shirt, including Steve Bull and long-time friend of WWLSC John Richards (also our Honorary President).



Diogo Jota 30th January 2018

With the transfer window coming to its conclusion came the news that all Wolves fans were waiting for, the Portuguese "Magician" Diogo Jota would make his on-loan move from Athletico Madrid a permanent one in the summer.

Wolves already had an exclusive option to make the deal a permanent one, and could have exercised that option during the January window, but instead issued a statement saying the deal will definitely happen in the summer.

Diogo has starred for Wolves since moving from Spain in the summer and had scored 12 goals, making him joint-top scorer at the time of going to print.

Wolves have four other loanee's on their books and have exclusive options to buy all of them. Willy Boly, Leo Bonatini, Alfred N'Diaye and Ruben Vinagre have all played their part in Wolves march towards the Premier League, and have showed they could all be an integral part of Wolves future.

Benik Afobe 31st January 2018

During the last day of the transfer window rumours were rife that Benik Afobe was on his way back to Wolves. However, as the transfer deadline reached its conclusion it seemed that the deal was dead and buried, a stalemate had ensued with Wolves unwilling to either buy Afobe permanently, or agree to a permanent deal at the end of a loan spell. But with half an hour to the end of the window Bournemouth caved in to Wolves demands and agreed to a loan deal worth to be in the region of £1 million.

It was a dream signing for both Afobe and the Wolves supporters, the striker enjoyed a successful year in Wolves colours between 2015 and 2016 after signing from Arsenal for £2m, the striker scoring 23 goals in 48 appearances.



Ben Stevenson 31st January 2018

There was one other signing on transfer deadline day, and that was the signing of 20-year-old Ben Stevenson from Coventry City. The youngster had been at the Sky Blues since he was eight years of age and the developing midfielder is regarded as one for the future.

It was reported that Wolves paid a small six-figure fee for Stevenson, and he was immediately loaned out to Colchester until the end of the season. It's expected he'll join up with the Wolves' under-23 squad when he returns.

Farewell David Edwards



With the new revolution under way at Wolves came the news that one of the old school players no longer had a future at the club. David Edwards left Molineux after nine-and-a-half years at the club to join Championship rivals Reading

Edwards arrived at Wolves from Luton Town of League One in January 2008 for a fee believed to be £675,000. Edwards was part of the Wolves teams that won the Championship in 2009 and League One in 2013, he also played three seasons with the club in the Premier League. He totalled 307 games and 44 goals for the club before

transferring to Reading in a £1million deal last August.

Dave was sponsored last season by our very own Peter Woodifield and Dave Slape, and was the winner of the WWLSC Player of the

Year award in our 50th Anniversary Season (here we can see him receiving the coveted trophy from Peter Woodifield, Peter Abbott and Dave Slape). We at London Wolves would like to say a big Thank You to Dave for his loyal service to Wolves, and wish him the Very Best of Luck at his new club.






Nouha Dicko 29th August 2017

Nouha Dicko joined fellow Championship club Hull City for a fee believed to be in the region of £3.5 million, he joined Wolves in the January of their League One titlewinning campaign in 2014, going on to finish as the club's top scorer with 13 goals from 19 appearances.

Overall he made 108 appearances for the club during his three-and-a-half-year stay, netting a total of 35 goals. Unfortunately for Nouha he picked up a serious cruciate knee ligament injury in the first month of the 2015/16 season, which was to rule him out for over a year. Following his comeback he had limited opportunities under Nuno's management with appearances limited to Carabao Cup games.

Jack Price 8th January 2018

The popular midfielder Jack Price sealed a move to MLS side Colorado Rapids for an undisclosed fee. Jack was Wolves through and through and had been at the club since he was seven years of age.

Having progressed through the Academy, Jack signed his first professional contract in March 2011, and made his Wolves debut against Gillingham in August 2013.

The 25-year-old went on to make 115 competitive appearances during his time at Wolves, scoring two goals. Jack played a crucial role in Wolves' promotion from Sky Bet League 1 in the 2013/14 season, making 30 appearances as Kenny Jackett's side amassed a record-breaking points total.

Lee Evans 10th January 2018

Lee Evans has left Wolves to join Sheffield United in a deal believed to be worth $\pounds750,000$. Evans joined Wolves from Newport County in January 2013 and went on to make 67 competitive appearances during his five years at Wolves, scoring on three occasions.

After making his debut against Preston in August 2013, he played an important part in Wolves' 2013/14 Sky Bet League 1 promotion season, appearing 26 times and scoring two goals in the process. Lee was also heavily involved the following season as Wolves narrowly missed out on the Play-Offs during their first season back in the Sky Bet Championship.



Andy Lonergan 27th August 2017

Andy Lonergan joined Leeds United of a free transfer at the end of August 2017. After the emergence of Harry Burgoyne and the signings of goalkeepers Will Norris and John Ruddy. Lonergan was not allocated a squad number for the 2017/18 season, despite Carl Ikeme being out due to illness.

Lonergan joined Wolves on 9th June 2016 from Fulham on a two-year deal. All in all he made 11 appearances

A Burton pub has received some early festive cheer after supporters from one of Burton Albion's rivals sent them a Christmas card – and a whopping tip for staff.



"I was absolutely gobsmacked to be honest with you, I didn't expect a Christmas card, especially with the money they put inside as well, saying to treat the staff.

"It is a fantastic gesture, I don't know if it's something they do as standard, and for other pubs, but either way we really appreciate it.

"Wolves fans always travel in great numbers. Some of our beers, particularly Stairway to Heaven, they serve in Wolverhampton and they love it so I think they made a beeline to the Burton Bridge.

"One of our regulars is actually a Wolves fan, so he always has friends come down in a coach to see the match.

"These guys from London, we knew they were in the pub, they obviously enjoyed the experience and the pub. We usually have supporters return after being here once the following season, we usually share a bit of banter, you know 'might not see you next year', but definitely nothing like this before." The card has been displayed at the pub on the notice board, and Mr Stout explained that it has been a talking point among staff and customers about the generosity of the supporters club.

ROME WASN'T BUILT IN A DAY

WOLVES 1-0 MIDDLESBROUGH

Saturday 5th August 2017



Millions spent on new players, yet another manager at the helm, and the optimism through the roof at Molineux culminating in a full house, the fourth biggest attendance since Molineux was rebuilt. And so the game went, it won't be remembered as one of the classics, but Wolves new look team came away with a 1-0 victory, and the early indications are that this team might just be the one to get us back to the Promised Land.

Wolves kicked off with seven debutants in their line-up and it showed in the early stages with the new-look team struggling to create any chances of real note. Then suddenly in the 33rd minute the season was well and truly under way when new striker Leo Bonatini opened his goal scoring account for Wolves.

The goal was completely out of the blue and all down to a real howler by Boro defender Daniel Ayala, he played a square ball across field just outside his own area, Bonatini intercepted the misplaced pass, said "Thank You Very Much" and moved forward a few steps before slotting the ball past the stranded Boro keeper.

Molineux erupted and suddenly Nuno's men had a spring in their step, passes were suddenly crisper and finding another gold shirt. However, right on the stroke of half-time Wolves were handed a massive let off. Christie delivered a cross from the right that found Braithwaite all on his own on the edge of the six yard box, but the Danish forward placed his header wide after coming under pressure from John Ruddy.

Wolves started the second-half on the front foot and went close to increasing their lead just six minutes after the break, Enobakhare went on a mazy run into the penalty area and he was only denied when

his shot was saved by the outstretched hand of Randolph. Bonatini was then sent racing clear of the Boro backline when Saiss threaded a lovely ball into his feet, but he couldn't quite find Jota with his attempted cross.

Suddenly Boro went all out in search of an equaliser, and as the game reached the last quarter Ruddy twice denied Assombalonga. Once in dubious circumstances with loud shouts from the Boro front line that he had handled outside the box as he blocked a bouncing through ball, and then with a superb save down to his right from the striker's angled drive.

Despite a few scares Wolves hung in there to start the campaign with a win, it wasn't pretty at times but it must be remembered Middlesbrough were locking horns with the best from the Premier last season and are favourites with the bookies to win the Championship title. Also, it's a brand new team at Wolves and it will inevitably take time before the players start to gel, but hopefully not too long.

NO AFTER EIGHTS LEFT IN THE BOX

WOLVES 1-0 YEOVIL TOWN

Tuesday 8th August 2016 (Carabao Cup 1st Rnd)

After their 8-2 drubbing at Luton on the first day of the season Yeovil were desperate there would be no repetition of that humiliation against Wolves, and they restored some pride by only losing 1-0 to a late Nouha Dicko goal. As usual these days with the early rounds of cup competitions Nuno Espirito Santo used this League Cup game as a run out for his fringe team players, he made nine changes to the team that beat Middlesbrough including Wolves debuts for Will Norris, Ruben Vinagre and Ryan Bennett.

Year after year Wolves always seem to struggle against lower league teams in the League Cup, and this game was no exception, with the opponents Yeovil Town from League 2. They eventually ran out as 1-0 winners, but it was an almighty struggle in Nuno Espirito Santo's first competitive game in charge at Molineux, with Yeovil on a damage limitation mission.

Yeovil set their stall from the off and that was to pack their defence and frustrate Wolves. As expected the home team dominated possession and their build-up play comprised of some neat passing, but with eleven men usually packing the Yeovil defence goal scoring opportunities were far and few between.

The best move of the half for Wolves came when Boly passed to Bonatini who then fed Jordan Graham, he then crossed to Bonatini but the Brazilian headed wide. That was basically it for the first 45 minutes, Ronan had two shots from range that went wide and Dicko hooked a shot over the bar. In fact, it was Yeovil who came closest to breaking the deadlock when Otis Khan forced Will Norris into a smart save with a powerful drive midway through the half.







Wolves continued their promotion charge with a hard earned victory at Reading, and this game proved that Wolves can be

Wolves also looked dangerous on the counter attack and Cavaleiro went close to a second goal when his shot was deflected into the side netting just before the break.

Reading started the second-half on the front foot, and both Boly and Neves showed there was grit in their play along with the silky passing skills as both made vital goalmouth blocks. For all their pressure Reading rarely looked like scoring, and on the break Wolves went close when Vinagre shot across the face of goal

and Bonatini fired just wide from outside the area.



Ruddy kept Wolves in it with a superb save in the 80th minute when he blocked Barrow's shot from point-blank range, and then Boly was at full stretch to clear Aluko's follow-up shot off the line. Wolves settled all the nerves with the all-important second goal in the 88th minute, Costa went on a mazy run down the right and the ball eventually came to Doherty who buried a left-footed finish past the keeper.

All those who predicted that the Wolves bubble was about to burst should just watch the highlights of this game. Two goals in either half helped Wolves to a 4-1 victory and go four points clear at the top of the league, and on this form it will take a very good team to overtake this majestic Wolves side. It was champagne football all the way, and at times Leeds must have been looking to use their shirts as white flags to raise in surrender.

Leeds came into the game with an impressive 2-0 win over Middlesbrough, but they were no match for a Wolves side

TROTTERS BEATEN BY A CANTER

WOLVES 5-1 BOLTON

Wolves roared to their biggest win of the season to go seven points clear at the top of the Championship table, it took their goal tally to nine in just three days after the midweek destruction of Leeds. Bolton arrived at Molineux on a seven match unbeaten run, but they were no match for this silky Wolves team who played them off the park for more or less the whole 90 minutes.

Man of the moment Ivan Cavaleiro grabbed himself a brace to make it four goals in three matches, and he continually skipped around the Bolton defenders as if they were wearing diving boots and not football boots.

It took Wolves just 13 minutes to break the deadlock and it was relatively straight forward considering some of the wonder goals already scored this season, Douglas sent over a pinpoint delivery from a corner on the right and Boly rose above the Bolton defence to powerfully head home from close range.



The second came 13 minute later and was sheer poetry. Neves hit a pass with the outside of his foot, it was superb vision and the technique way beyond the Championship. Jota collected the inch perfect delivery and clipped the ball past the onrushing Alnwick, all that was left for Bonatini to do was the simple task of nodding the ball into the empty net.

The game exploded on the touchline a minute before the break when the Wolves bench reacted furiously to a challenge by Bolton defender David Wheater on Jota. That sparked a heated response from their Bolton counterparts and the two groups furiously clashed. Once the dust had settled, referee Keith Stroud gave both Nuno and Bolton boss Phil Parkinson their marching orders to the stands.



What the two managers saw from their seats in the stands in the second-half was Wolves strolling to an easy victory. Just as the hour mark elapsed Saiss was upended mercilessly by Robinson in the Bolton area for a stonewall penalty, Cavaleiro stepped up and clinically dispatched it to the bottom right-hand corner to make it 3-0.







That should have been the signal to storm forward and seriously up the goal difference, however some poor defending allowed Buckley to reach a through ball and poke past Ruddy to gift Bolton a consolation goal in the 75th minute. It mattered little as Wolves added a fourth with 8 minutes left, a poor clearance by Alwnick fell straight to Costa who then fed Cavaleiro just inside the area, the striker left his marker in a heap before despatching an unstoppable shot into the top of the net.

The icing was put on the cake three minutes from time when Ruddy's long clearance found Jota in Bolton's half, he raced into the area before slotting past the keeper to make the final score 5-1. That's the fifth straight win and eighth in the last nine for Nuno's boys, and on this form they look absolutely unstoppable.


