London Wolves Player of the Season 2018-2019

Raúl Jiménez

London Wolves Members have voted Raúl Jiménez as their "Player of the Season" for 2018-2019. In his first season at Wolves, Raúl chipped in with 13 goals and 7 assists, and also scored 4 goals in the memorable FA Cup run.

In Wolves first season back in the Premier League all the players throughout the team deserve a special mention for some outstanding performances. However, it was Raúl who polled 45% of the votes from the members and our congratulations go to the Mexican striker for an impressive season. Joao Moutinho was runner-up with 24% of the vote.





The 27-year-old centre-forward initially joined Wolves on a season long loan, becoming Nuno Espirito Santo's first new signing of summer 2018, before his move from Benfica became permanent on July 1st 2019 for a fee of £32 million.

Jiménez began his career for Club América, helping his boyhood side clinch two Liga MX titles, before securing a move to Europe and Atlético Madrid.

After a season and 21 appearances in Spain, the six-foot-two-inch striker moved to Benfica where he helped fire the Lisbon outfit to back-to-back Primeira Liga titles. In 120 appearances for Benfica he scored 31 goals and created 15, and averaged a goal or assist every 75 minutes in their 2017-2018 title winning campaign.

As of yet there hasn't been the opportunity to present Raúl with his award, but Club Secretary Dave Slape is already looking at a potential presentation, once this has been arranged the members will be notified accordingly. Pictures of Raúl receiving his award will appear in the next newsletter.

Raúl's season had the perfect ending as he was named player of the tournament as Mexico beat the USA 1-0 to win the Gold Cup. Raúl scored five goals and provided two assists during six appearances to help Mexico lift the trophy in Chicago.

Those assists included a back-heeled pass to Jonathan Dos Santos for the winning goal in the final, and after the game he was given the 'Golden Ball' for being the stand-out player of the competition.





Wolves' Transfer Activity for the Season 2019-2020

Since the 2018-2019 season finished, the transfer market has been relatively quiet with regards to the arrival of new players. There have been numerous rumours in the press, but at the time of going to print there have been no major signings, apart from making the loan deals for Raúl Jiménez and Leander Dendoncker permanent ones.

At the same time six players have left the club. Helder Costa has gone to Leeds United on loan for a season, with an obligation for the Yorkshire club to make the deal permanent for an undisclosed fee. Ivan Cavaleiro is another player who has gone on a season long loan, this time to Fulham with the London club having the option to sign him on a permanent basis next summer. Ethan Ebanks-Landell has moved to Shrewsbury Town for an undisclosed fee, and Kortney Hause has made the move to Aston Villa for £3 million following a period on loan. Dutch winger Sherwin Seedorf has left to join Motherwell, and Michal Zyro has been released. Finally, Ryan Giles has gone to Shrewsbury Town on loan for the season.

New Signings

Raúl Jiménez 1st July 2019

Wolves smashed their transfer record to sign striker Raúl Jiménez in a £32million deal.

Jiménez has been a revelation since joining from Benfica on loan, netting 15 times and providing a further seven assists in the Premier League, and scoring 4 goals in the FA Cup. Wolves have taken up their option to sign him on a permanent deal, handing the Mexican a bumper four-year contract to tie him to Molineux until 2023.

Leander Dendoncker

1st July 2019

Wolves have signed Leander Dendoncker for £12 million. The 24-year-old midfielder joined Wolves on a season-long loan from Anderlecht last August, with the club having an obligation to sign him this summer.

After taking a while to break into the team, he made a big impression as Nuno Espirito Santo's side reached the FA Cup semi-finals and finished seventh in the Premier League.

Jesus Vallejo 27th July 2019

Wolves have signed 22-year-old Real Madrid defender Jesus Vallejo on a season-long loan.

The club confirmed the news after the defender watched his new team mates play against Crusaders in the Europa League. Vallejo joins on the back of captaining Spain to European Under-21 Championship glory this summer. He has made a total of 22 appearances for the Spanish under-21 team.

Patrick Cutrone 30th July 2019

Italy striker Patrick Cutrone has joined Wolves from AC Milan in a potential £20million deal. Wolves will initially pay £16m for the forward, with the deal including a further £4m in add-ons. The 21-year-old has penned a four-year contract and will become the first Italian to ever play for Wolves.

Cutrone scored 16 goals in 42 games in his breakthrough season in 2017/18 before netting nine in 43 last year.

London Wolves Member Peter Davies at Wembley

When Wolves played Spurs at Wembley on Saturday 29th December 2018 it was reported that it was their first visit there for 40 years. We can disclose that our very own WWLSC member Peter Davies graced the Wembley turf on Saturday May 30th 2015, the first time a Wolves shirt had been there since May 29th 1988. It was twenty seven years, almost to the day after Wolves beat Burnley 2-0 in the final of the Sherpa Van Trophy with goals from Andy Mutch and Robbie Dennison. Steve Bull, the fourth divisions top goal scorer that year, didn't manage to get on the score sheet that day but played his usual huge part.

Peter has kindly penned an article about the time he represented Wolves as one of 64 clubs' fans chosen to sing the traditional pre-match cup final hymn, 'Abide with Me' ahead of the Arsenal vs Villa FA Cup Final. And what a great idea that was, bringing together the football family to symbolise what the competition represents. Sadly the idea seems to have been abandoned by the FA despite it being a huge success. Arsenal went on to win an entertaining game comfortably by 4-1 on this occasion.

Fans from each of the sixty four clubs who got through to the 3rd round of the FA Cup in 2015 were invited to submit a short FA Cup-related story about themselves and their love for their club, and I won it for Wolves despite some strong competition from within the club itself (I was told). The competition was run by the Songs of Praise unit of the BBC in partnership with the FA and judged by an independent panel.

The Winning Entry

My Dad went to the Wembley FA Cup Final to see Wolves beat Leicester City 3-1, six days after I was born on April 24th 1949; two happy events for my parents. I still have Dad's program and Sporting Star for that day. I was born and lived for my first two years at 10, Molineux Fold, one of the closest houses to Molineux and in the shadow of St Peter's Church. Long since demolished, the little end-terrace house was adjacent to the Molineux Hotel right behind the South Bank. I was named after and christened at St Peter's. My first clear childhood memory was of being really frightened with Mom holding me behind our picket fence on a Saturday afternoon, watching thousands pouring past just before three o'clock. Mom and Dad stayed together for the next 35 years until their death. They were married and were buried at St Peter's, where Billy Wright, captain of Wolves and England was too. Mom knew Billy as an acquaintance, living in the Molineux vicinity in the early 1950's. Sir Jack Hayward, fan and one-time club owner was also recently buried there. In the 1998-9 season, I attended a London-Wolves 'meet-the-players' event in Slough ahead of the away QPR game where two of my Wolves hero's, Steve Bull and John Richards, autographed my 1949 birth certificate. I took it there for that very purpose! So my support for Wolves is as close to genetic as it can be! As a Wolverhampton choirboy, Abide with Me was a regular hymn at evensong, so to sing this again at Wembley at the 2015 Cup Final would be such an emotional moment, connecting the football generations and in tribute to my Mom, Dad, Billy, Sir Jack and Wolves.

The photo shows the choir on the Saturday morning of the final for rehearsal on the pitch while the mowers were giving the grass a final cut and the BBC crew (with Dan Walker) were doing their pre-match preparations. At the front you can see Steve Thompson our musical director standing next to the Arsenal fan Peter with his grandson Edwin who was there to be Peter's guide for the day as he is totally blind. Steve's wife Velveta (not in the picture) happens to be from Wolverhampton and a Wolves fan!

The Newcastle fan, sadly since deceased, was 100 years old and we had two Elvis impersonators in Ken (Gateshead) and Darryl (PNE). Vicky (Scunthorpe) was featured in an aired BBC feature showing us her house, including the toilet, decorated throughout in claret and blue, wall paper, toilet paper, furniture and carpets. Charlton's Christine was a retired police officer and we had three men of the cloth in Dan (Villa), Graham (Bournemouth) and Peter (Southampton), now vicar of Stroud but who officiated at Zara and Mike Tyndall's wedding. David (Liverpool) is a Hillsborough survivor and watercolour artist and designer.

What an incredible privilege to represent my team at Wembley and an amazing experience on the day. Walking out of the Villa end tunnel to the ear-splitting din of 90,000 fans in full voice, flags waving, acrobats whirling Cirque-du-Soleil-style and the heat of the 20 foot high pyrotechnic flames blasting through the heat of the already hot late May sunshine; an experience none of us will ever forget.

And among the fans choir ourselves, we also made friends we'll never forget. Sadly about a third of the choir did disappear after that weekend without a trace but with the help of our 'FA Cup Fans Choir' Facebook page, the remainder of the choir took on a life of its own thereafter and various meet-ups continue to this day and hopefully will into the future.

'Abide with Me', pre-FA Cup final, for most of us in the 2015 choir, hasn't been the same in 2016, 2017, 2018; no similar fans choir, less impactful, less well organised technically and most importantly, missing the main message of uniting the football family with representatives from across a good selection of the clubs which enter the FA Cup competition across all the leagues. It's a real opportunity missed by the FA. Not the same individuals, no, not the 2015 choir of course, nor even the same 64 clubs as was represented in 2015, but, that a choir made up of a cross section of clubs and wearing their club shirts on the Wembley turf before the FA Cup final, singing football's traditional and unifying 'Abide with Me', can only complement the underlying message and ethos of the FA Cup competition itself, something which I find so surprising the FA seem not to have wanted to perpetuate since; surprising, because it was such a massive success in 2015.

Terry Peachey London Wolves Member 1938 – 2018



Terry Peachey was a London Wolves member for forty five years and a club official for more than ten, he sadly passed away on Friday the 27th July 2018 at the age of 80, after spending five weeks in hospital.

Terry was our Club Treasurer and then the Travel Secretary from the mid 1970's. He oversaw the allocation of hundreds of match tickets for the 1980 League Cup Final and the 1981 FA Cup Semi Final.

Terry first came to see a Wolves match with me, and although he was a fan of Chelsea, he was soon converted by the Doog and Waggy and the rest of the Wolves team of the time. He soon became a member of London Wolves and avidly followed the Wolves until ill health curtailed his travelling days.

Terry was a self-employed window cleaner in Leatherhead, Surrey but still attended every match. He was a big guy, six feet

four inches tall with an appetite to match. I remember after a match, being last from a chip shop, to meet him coming out from a KFC with a 'dessert'?

Also, after a night match in Derby, we ate in an Indian restaurant, after which Terry went straight to a Chinese take-away to get something to eat for the train home. He also liked a drink and more than once slept from Liverpool Victoria to the end of the line and back.



After Committee meetings in Central London, we would pop into the bar on Victoria Station. Terry would follow his pint with a scotch, and once told me he'd spent £40 that day and was still sober.

A large number of people, including a good representation from London Wolves, attended the cremation service, and there was standing room only in the chapel.

Although Terry continued to be a valued member of your committee for many years, quite a few as Minutes Secretary, ill health forced him to step down at the AGM, not having been able to attend meetings for some time.

Terry will never be forgotten and always remembered for being one of the boys.

A Tribute to Bill Slater CBE 1927 - 2018



On December 12th 2018 it was announced that former Wolves legend Bill Slater had passed away at the age of 91 following a long battle with Alzheimer's disease and illness. Slater was the last great amateur of English football. Initially operating as an inside forward, and then most frequently as a "they-shall-not-pass centre-half". He played more than 300 games for Wolves during their 1950s golden age, winning three League titles and the FA Cup. He also played 12 times for England, putting in four solid performances in the 1958 World Cup.

In 1951, when he turned out for Blackpool at Wembley alongside Stanley Matthews, Bill Perry and Stan Mortensen, he was the last amateur to play in the FA Cup final, the Tangerines lost 2-0 to Newcastle United. He had better luck nine years later when, by then a part-timer, he became the last man to date to lift the Cup for our beloved Wolves following their 3-0 victory over Blackburn Rovers.

William John Slater was born at Clitheroe, Lancashire, on April 29 1927, attending the grammar school and going on to study Physical Education at Carnegie College in Leeds. In September 1949 he made his debut as an amateur for Blackpool. He did his National Service in Germany, and after the 1951 Cup Final defeat moved to London to be near his future wife.



After finishing college, in December 1951 he signed for Brentford, playing wing-half alongside Ron Greenwood and Jimmy Hill. After a handful of games he moved to the Midlands to take up a post as a lecturer in PE at Birmingham University, and joined Wolves, making his debut in a 6-2 thumping of the recently crowned champions, Manchester United.

By then he had already won the first of 20 caps for the England Amateur side, and that summer he had played for Great Britain at the Helsinki Olympics, scoring an extra-time goal in the 5-3 preliminary-round defeat to Luxembourg.

At home, however, it was the perfect time to be joining Wolves, who were a major force. They won the League Championship in 1954, 1958 and 1959, as well as the Cup the next year, but they are equally remembered for their epic floodlit fixtures with top European sides.

His full England career began in 1954, though his opportunities were restricted by the emergence of the legendary Duncan Edwards. But by the time of the 1958 World Cup, Edwards had died in the Munich air disaster, and Slater played four games in Sweden in midfield.

Wolves won their second League Championship in a row the next season, lost out on the hat-trick in 1960, but took the FA Cup. Slater was named Footballer of the Year. He left Wolves in 1963, having played 339 games, and without a single booking. He retired after a brief stint back at Brentford.

In retirement, Slater became deputy director of the Crystal Palace sports centre, and was later director of physical education at Liverpool University and Birmingham University. He also coached his gymnast daughter, Barbara, who competed at the 1976 Olympic Games. In 1989 he was elected president of the British Gymnastics Association.

Bill Slater was appointed OBE in 1982, upgraded to CBE in 1998. He was married to Marion, with whom he had four daughters: Barbara became the BBC's first female Director of Sport in 2009.

If you haven't read his book, "Joker in the Pack", it's worth a read. Robert Goddard even got a kiss from him when he bought the book.

Wolves' Europa League qualifiers explained



Wolves qualified for the Europa League after Manchester City defeated Watford in the FA Cup final. That meant Nuno Espirito Santo's team entered the Europa League at the second qualifying stage. They'll need to get past three two-legged ties if they're to reach the 48-team group stage, which runs from September to December.

Europa League games all take place on Thursday nights and Wolves' games will be broadcast live on BT Sport, which has the UK rights to the competition. Below is an explanation of how the qualifiers work and who Wolves potential opponents might be.



Wolves will face either Crusaders from Northern Ireland or B36 Torshavn the Faroe Islands in their first European tie in 39 years. The two minnows will play each other in the first qualifying round on July 11 and 18, which means Wolves won't know their opponents until a week before their second qualifying round tie.

Wolves will host the winners at home in the first leg on July 25, with the away leg taking place a week later on August 1. Crusaders finished fourth in the NIFL Premiership League season, while B36 Torshavn were third in the Faroe Islands Premier League in 2018.

Qualifiers Explained

All the qualifying rounds before the group stage see teams split into seeded and unseeded teams, based on the 2019 UEFA club coefficients. They are two-legged ties played home and away.

After a small preliminary round the Europa League qualifiers start in late July with the first qualifying round, which Wolves won't take part in.

Some 94 teams, mostly including minnows from far-flung European destinations such as Macedonia, Kazakhstan, Lithuania, Iceland and Finland, as well as sides from Ireland and Northern Ireland, will take part. A few more established teams such as Rangers and Malmo will also compete in the first round, which takes place on July 11 and 18.

The second qualifying round is where Wolves enter the competition and takes place on July 25 (five days after Wolves play their final game in the Asia Trophy in China) and August 1. All the winners from the first round join a host of new teams and the competition is split into two separates sections:

- "Champions Path" (for all the league champions and a host of clubs who lose in Champions League qualifiers)
- "League Path" (for cup winners and league non-champions, such as Wolves).

The draw of the 94 teams took place on June 19, before round one, meaning Wolves won't know their opponents until that first round has been completed just a week before (July 18).

As well as Wolves, teams joining the draw at this stage include this year's semi-finalists Eintracht Frankfurt (who finished seventh in the Bundesliga), Spanish side Espanyol (seventh in La Liga), Sparta Prague and Dutch side AZ. As Wolves will likely be seeded they should avoid these well-established sides.

If Wolves triumph over two legs they will move to the third qualifying round. There will be 72 teams and the draw takes place on July 22, before the second round takes place. The third round ties are on August 8 (on the eve of the Premier League season which starts on August 10) and August 15. Teams joining the "League Path" at this stage will include Feyenoord, Braga and AEK Athens but, again, Wolves will likely be seeded.

Finally, there is a play-off round, which is for 26 League Path winners from the third round (this is Wolves' part of the draw) and a further 16 in the Champions Path.

The seeded draw is on August 5 and the ties take place on August 22 and 29.

Should Wolves progress through all three rounds they will join the Europa League group stage, which runs from September 19 to December 12 (draw on August 30). This is 12 groups of four teams, with sides playing each other home and away in a round robin format. Again, it's drawn based on seeding pots.

This is where some of Europe's big boys join the competitions. Manchester United, Arsenal, Sevilla, Wolfsburg, Lazio, Sporting Lisbon, Rennes and Borussia Mönchengladbach are confirmed to take part. A number of Champions League qualifier losers also go into the Europa League group stage.

Then after that, the top two teams in each group go through to the last-32 knockout stage. The Europa League final takes place in Gdansk, Poland on May 27, 2020.

Dave reported that the Player of the Year for 2017/18 was Conor Coady with 30 Votes, with other votes going to Ruben Neves (23) Diogo Jota (5) Matt Docherty (3) and Willy Boly (2).

Geoff Castro asked if membership was increasing and Dave Slape replied that yes it was.

A vote of thanks was given to Dave Slape for all his work over the last year.

6. Treasurer's Report:

In Carol's absence Peter Woodifield gave the report. A copy of the financial Statement was also handed to members attending the meeting. There is a small balance owed for tickets (\pounds 60). At the end of the season there is a slight profit of \pounds 1,082.87.

Acceptance of the Statement was proposed by Peter Abbott and seconded by Dave Gilson.

7. Travel Secretary's report:

Peter reported that we ran trips to all 27 home games and 14 away games. He thanked Morris Jacobs who provided transport to a number of midweek games. The highest attended trips were:

- Home Sunderland (37) and Sheffield Wednesday (37)
- Away Ipswich (34) and Bolton (21)

Unsurprisingly there was an increase in the average number travelling to both home and away games.

Fare prices varied throughout the year because we have to compete with other travellers in order to get the cheapest fares. The fare for home games varied between £16-£25. Train companies demand immediate payment once the booking is confirmed. Bookings with all train companies can be made up to 3 months in advance, but this is not always possible with matches being re-scheduled.

There was a deficit from trips of £534.95 as the Club part subsidised some of the more expensive long away trips. The Club also suffered a loss on the cancelled Reading home trip. The outstanding money from 2016/17 has now been collected with one person owing money from 2017/18.

We have renewed 6 club season tickets under the "Early Bird" scheme for the 2017/18 season at a cost of £2,702. A loss of £300.50 was made from the sale of match day tickets. Peter passed on his thanks to members who loaned their season tickets to the Club when unable to attend home matches. Members have also purchased 13 away season tickets.

Wolves have increased ticket prices for next season. Adult prices for Category A matches range from £25 - £40, and Category B from £22 - £35. A loyalty points system will be used. The ticket Office have suggested that it is advisable for Non-season ticket holders to join My Wolves Membership. As well as priority they will also receive Wolves cash on all their purchases (retail or ticketing). It is £25 to join.

Peter thanked the Wolves ticket office, particularly Dave Wood, in meeting our requests for match tickets last season and thanked Dave Slape for his help during the season.

8. Social Secretary's report:

Dave on behalf of Roy reported that the Christmas event had been "a bit of a squeeze" but money had been raised for Mel Eves' charity. Colin Brazier had attended. Two smaller events were held at the Blue Brick. A table is reserved at the Blue Brick for every home game with table service so no need to queue for drinks. *A vote of thanks was given to Roy for his efforts over the season.*

9. Newsletter Editor's report:

It was decided to have a smaller sized magazine. Steve Ray reported that 200 copies of the magazine were printed in each run and asked members for articles or suggestions. The next newsletter should be with Dave Slape for the start of the season. Steve thanked Stuart Earl and Stefan Leonard for their assistance with Match reports and Peter Bartlett for sending photos.

10. Website Editor's report:

Peter Bartlett reported that a Betting Company sponsors us £330 for a profile on the website which covers the costs. Peter is currently considering a re-design of the site. Peter said that we currently have approximately 3,500 followers on twitter. The latest travel news now goes on the London Wolves Facebook page, normally on the day that we have notice of it. Peter also said that the Express and Star news feed is now working again.

11. Election of Officers:

After all the committed confirmed their willingness to continue to stand, Derek Archer proposed that the committee be reelected en-bloc. Seconded by Dave Gilson. Proposal carried unanimously

12. Membership Fees:

A proposal was put forward that the membership fee remains the same. Proposed by Dave Gilson seconded by Geoff Castro. Carried unanimously.

13. Any other business:

(i) Wolves Women

Peter Bartlett raised the issue of sponsorship of Wolves Women. London Wolves have sponsored Anna Price (nee Perks) and the team for the past four years. A query was raised as why this was not showing in the accounts and Peter Woodifield said he and Carol would investigate. It was proposed that we continue sponsorship for another season at a cost of £500. Proposed by Steve Ray and seconded by Simon Iverme. Carried unanimously.

(ii) Flag Parade

Thanks were given to those who took part in the flag parade before the Sheffield Wednesday game. Dave Slape said that someone had seen the flag and joined the club as a result.

(iii) Fans Parliament

70 fans form the Wolves Fan's Parliament and Peter Abbott represents "remote fans".

(iv) Safe Standing

Peter Abbott said that Lawrie Dalrymple wants Wolves to incorporate safe standing into the new South Bank if it is allowed.

(v) Club Credit Card

Stuart has recently moved and with his hospitalisation this has not yet been taken further.

(vii) Commentary

Live commentary of matches will be free on the Wolves website next season.

There being no further business the meeting was closed.

Kenny Hibbitt Book Signing The Grain Store, Saturday 29th September 2018



Just over 50 years ago Ronnie Allen made one of his best ever signings when, in November 1968, as manager of Wolves he paid £5000 to Bradford Park Avenue for a certain Kenny Hibbitt.

After 16 years he finally left Wolves in 1984 on a free transfer. In total, he played 544 games for Wolves, scoring 114 goals, only Derek Parkin on 571 has made more appearances.

Kenny has written about his experiences, good and bad, in a well-illustrated book called **"Seasons of My Life"** with Tim Nash.

With Kenny being a long time associate and friend of London Wolves I decided to try and arrange a book signing event for our members. So one Monday evening in early

August I travelled to Bridgnorth to attend the launch of Kenny's new book, and to also meet Tim Nash and have a chat with them both about London Wolves promoting the new book.

August

<u>TWO TOFFEE</u> <u>HAMMER BLOWS</u>

WOLVES 2-2 EVERTON Saturday 11th August 2018

Wolves are back in the big time and the early signs are looking good, they twice fought back to start the new campaign with a 2-2 draw. However, playing with the big boys showed Wolves that if you give Premier League opponents an inch of space, then you are going to get punished, and Nuno's boys learned a harsh lesson, in that life in the Premiership is very unforgiving when the smallest of errors are made.

Wolves kicked off in front of a massive Molineux crowd of 31,231, the highest since 1981, and the game started at a brisk pace as Wolves continued where they left off at the end of last season in the Championship, with their patient passing game and lightning quick breaks from the back.

All seemed to be hunky-dory until the 17th minute when Wolves got a reality check, that if you lose concentration for a split second in the premiership then you are going to get punished. A free kick from the left wasn't dealt with by Boly, who made a real hash of a headed clearance, and as the ball dropped to the ground Richarlison stabbed home from close range.

Wolves slowly played their way back into the game, and it suddenly swung in their favour five minutes before half-time when Everton were reduced to ten men. Jagielka stretched to win the ball ahead of Jota after a heavy touch, and caught the Portuguese Maestro with his studs as he raced through on goal. It seemed harsh but the referee had no hesitation in showing a straight red card to the Everton defender.



Up stepped that man Neves who carefully placed the ball on the turf about twenty yards out, the Portuguese Wizard took two strides into the ball and stuck it right in the top right-hand corner of the net. The noise went through the sound barrier as Neves celebrated in front of the North Bank.



As the game restarted after the break the rain poured down on Molineux, and the ten men of Everton took a more defensive formation, hoping to catch Wolves on the break, and nearly scored from one of those breaks on the hour mark. Tosun gathered the ball in a bit of space just outside the box and fired a shot towards the far corner, but Patricio was equal to the task.

The action immediately went to the other end and Bennett put Jiménez in behind Keane, who was outpaced by the Mexican, but his effort was too close to Pickford who clawed his shot away. Another mistake by the Wolves defence resulted in Everton regaining the lead. Tosun laid the ball off for Richarlison to run into the box from the left, and Coady failed to get close enough to the Brazilian who bent the ball around the skipper, and into the far corner beyond Patricio.

Wolves looked to be heading for defeat, but with ten minutes left up stepped that man Neves again, he curled in a superb cross from the left, and Jiménez peeled off Keane and placed his header into the back of the net for the equaliser. Wolves pressed for the winner, but that killer touch was missing in the final third and the game ended 2-2.

Anne Boleyn may have been Queen of England, but Big Willy Boly was King of Molineux as Wolves took last year's Premier League champions Manchester City right to the wire with a performance that suggests that they're not just satisfied with survival, but here to make a strong challenge and finish in the top half of the table.

Nuno's men were rank outsiders to win this game, but they showed no signs of settling for second best and went for the jugular straight from the off. There was no sitting back and hoping to catch City on the break, Wolves were in it to win it.

After a fully committed first 20 minutes Wolves went within a whisker of taking the lead as they attacked with purpose yet again, Jota and Jiménez were two-on-two with two City defenders, and when Jota played the ball across to Jiménez he slotted in at the far post, but the cheers soon faded as the referee disallowed the goal for offside.

City suddenly upped the tempo and rattled the woodwork twice within two minutes. Aguero slid a first-time effort against the foot of the post from 12 yards, before Sterling fired in a shot from 25 yards that looked destined for the top corner, before Patricio somehow got a hand on it and tipped it onto the bar.

City came out after the break and took the game by the horns as they tried to break Wolves resolve, but a moment of magic from Costa sent the sound levels up a decibel and changed the face of the game. He left Kompany and Laporte for dead as he raced through on goal, he should have scored but tried to round Ederson who blocked his shot at the expense of a corner. Moutinho played it short, it came back to him and he delivered a peach of cross that was bundled over the line by Boly at the far post.

The goal stood even though later replays showed the ball had in fact been directed into the net by the big defenders hand. Wolves were finding more space on the



counter now and Jota was in a great position in the City box, but a heavy touch saw him pushed wide and Neves drove the resulting 20-yarder wide.

With twenty minutes to go City were on level terms. Neves went to tackle Sterling on the edge of the area and the striker theatrically went down, even though Neves didn't appear to touch him. Gundogan sent over the free-kick and Laporte smashed his header home beyond Patricio who had no chance.

There were chances for both Wolves and City as the game reached its climax, and Aguero came closest when his free-kick from 25 yards clipped the top of Patricio's crossbar with two minutes left on the clock, but Wolves hung on for a deserved point to announce their return to the big time.

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY 0-2 WOLVES Tuesday 28th August 2018 (Carabao Cup 2nd Round)

Well it was that time of the season again, where after just a few games managers rest their weary players in a cup competition belittled by nearly every team in the league. The Carabao Cup has become a mechanism where fringe players get a game whilst first team players get a night off.

Here at Hillsborough, Sheffield Wednesday manager Jos Luhukay made eleven

Even lowly Fleetwood Town managed by the notorious, sorry reformed Joey Barton fielded eleven changes to his previous line-up, after he admitted the League Cup was not a priority. His team was duly spanked 4-0 at Premier side Leicester, but the days of FA fines for fielding weakened teams have long gone.

As far as our game was concerned Wolves cruised into the 3rd Round of the Caribou Cup with a comfortable 2-0 victory. However, with so many players playing their first game of the season the first-half was low on quality with lots of passes going astray, and very little going on with regards to goalmouth action.

Wolves' best chance of the half fell to Gibbs-White, but he failed to capitalise on a great opening on the half-hour mark when he dragged his shot wide of the Wednesday left-hand post after being put through on goal by Bonatini. The young England international then had a shot deflected just over before the interval after exchanging passes with Bonatini.

In a rare attack Wednesday nearly levelled when Fletcher's overhead kick appeared destined for the net, but Ruddy pulled off a superb save to maintain the Wolves lead.

Wolves finally wrapped up the victory with five minutes left on the clock, Costa raced past his man and was hauled down in the box for a penalty. The Portuguese Maestro picked himself off the floor to fire home the spot-kick and make the final score 2-0 to Wolves. Nuno's Boys now play Leicester at home in the third-round.

A game that had everything, attacking football, goals, chance after chance, saves, and more incident than you could shake a stick at. Wolves ended up 4-3 winners after Diogo Jota netted an injury time winner and send Molineux into absolute bedlam.

Ruben Neves set the tone in the second minute with a rasping 30-yarder that Schmeichel magnificently tipped over at full stretch. A minute later Wolves were ahead, Dendoncker won possession in midfield and fed Jiménez who played wide to Moutinho, and his on-the-button cross was met by Jota who edged ahead of Simpson to finish from close range: 1-0.

In the 12th minute Wolves doubled their lead following another Moutinho assist. This time it came from a corner as the midfield maestro whipped a cross into the six-yard box, Maguire had two Wolves defenders to mark, and couldn't prevent the late-arriving Bennett powering a header into the net: 2-0.

Wolves got off to the worst possible start in the second-half, conceding just two minutes after the break. Leicester punished some poor Wolves defending in a swift counter-attack. Bennett misjudged a City clearance, allowing Vardy to get on the ball, he then found Gray who skipped past the non-existent challenge of Saiss before slotting the ball into the far corner of the net: 2-1.

Four minutes later and some more shocking defending resulted in Leicester levelling the scores. Jonny stumbled in his own area and gifted the ball to Barnes, he drilled his shot through Coady and into the corner from 15 yards for the equaliser: 2-2.

Wolves hit back again and began to flourish, with the inspirational Neves at the heart of everything, and it was the Portuguese Magician who created the third Wolves goal in the 64th minute. Neves picked up the ball on the edge of his own area, had a quick look up and drilled an inch-perfect diagonal pass into the path of Jota, he took the ball on his chest and brought it down before lashing it past Schmeichel. Brilliant, brilliant goal: 3-2.

With three minutes left on the clock a spell of Leicester pressure ended with a needless free-kick given away on the right. Maddison delivered the ball into the danger zone and Morgan bullied his way past three surrounding Wolves defenders to get on the end of it, sending a header back across goal and into the far corner: 3-3.

It all looked set to finish 3-3 but Wolves had other ideas. With just seconds remaining on the clock Neves sprayed another exquisite through-ball wide to Jiménez, he then squared the ball back across the area into Jota's path, and the striker calmly sidefooted home to send Molineux absolutely delirious.



The dramatic finale saw Nuno Espirito Santo race onto the field to celebrate with his players, but he was deemed to have overstepped the mark by the referee who sent him to the stands. But absolutely no one cared as soon after the full-time whistle sounded to end a breathless encounter: Final Score - 4-3.

Wolves came back from the brink of a disaster to salvage a draw at League 1 Shrewsbury Town in this FA Cup 4th round tie at the New Meadow Stadium. Matt Doherty's last-gasp header rescued Wolves as they hit back from 2-0 down to force a replay. The defender struck in the second minute of stoppage time to earn a 2-2 draw, and a potential 5th round tie away at Bristol City.

It was cold, wet and windy in Shrewsbury, and different surroundings to what Nuno's Boys are usually accustomed to. The pitch was more like a cow's field than the usual green carpet his players usually strut their stuff on, and in the first-half the football quality matched the condition of the pitch.



Wolves were lacklustre, mundane and short of ideas. Their League 1 opponents played with plenty of aggression, and the chance of a Premier team scalp meant that every tackle by a Shrewsbury player was made as though their lives depended on it.

Traore, brought back into the team for the game, did his best and was involved in the brightest moment of the opening 20 minutes when he superbly spun his man, raced deep into the Shrewsbury half and played in Costa, but a poor touch in the box allowed a defender to close him down and the chance went begging.

Traore was also involved in the best chance of the half for either team. Doherty skipped past a couple of challenges to the byline and pulled the ball back for the Spaniard who ballooned over the bar from 12 yards. The £18m man has scored just once this season, and it was Doherty who looked more of a danger in front of goal when he had Wolves first shot on target after 35 minutes, however it was saved by the keeper.

It had been a drab first half and devoid of much goalmouth action, but all that changed at the start of the second half. Just two minutes after the restart Neves couldn't reach a Gibbs-White pass and suddenly Okenabirhie was racing towards the Wolves box, he played in Greg Docherty who lashed the ball goalwards from a tight angle, it took a deflection off Saiss and flew past Ruddy into the net.

Wolves suddenly realised they had a game on their hands and tried to respond, and Neves' effort deflected just inches wide after hitting Norburn. Goalkeeper Arnold then came to Shrewsbury's rescue when his excellent save kept out Costa's six-yard header.

However, Shrewsbury stood firm and doubled their lead in the 71st minute. They won a corner out on the left and Norburn swung it in, Waterfall climbed higher than all the Wolves defenders and powered in a header from six yards.

Nuno immediately sent on Cavaleiro for Giles, and within three minutes Wolves had pulled one back. Cavaleiro twisted and turned near the corner flag on the right and whipped a wicked ball across the face of goal where the menacing Jiménez turned it in. Wolves threw everything but the kitchen sink at Shrewsbury in the final minutes with a succession of crosses and corners, but without creating a clear-cut chance. But it finally arrived in the 93rd minute when Doherty powered home a header from Traore's cross to salvage a dramatic late draw.

It was a top-notch performance from Wolves as they did a demolition job on West Ham at Molineux. It was a dominant display as Nuno's Boys dominated from start to finish. West Ham would have gone above Wolves in the table had they won, but the score ended 3-0 to the Wanderers and could have been higher had it not been for Fabianski between the West Ham posts.

Wolves had another big shout for a penalty turned down just a few minutes later. Jota was played in by Jiménez and Zabaleta seemed to push him from behind before winning the ball, but despite all the appeals referee Coote awarded just a corner.

The continuous siege on Fabianski's goal final paid off in the 80th minute as Wolves gave themselves some breathing space with that all important second goal. A freekick on the left was delivered into the area by Moutinho, and Jiménez got in front of Rice to find the far corner from eight yards.



With West Ham looking for an unlikely route back into the game in the final minutes, 2-0 became 3-0 with four minutes to go. Moutinho lifted the ball forward into the path of Jota who then played Jiménez through, and the Mexican delicately lifted the ball over Fabianski to put the icing well and truly on the cake.

Wolves are starting to get the hang of this Premiership lark. In this reverse fixture on the opening day game at Molineux, an experienced Everton side showed a naive Wolves team what you can, and can't do playing in the Premier League. In that 2-2 draw Wolves were embarking on a learning curve, and were punished for a couple of defensive errors that you so often get away with in the Championship.

It was a breathtaking goal, and things got even better two minutes later. Bamba was pick-pocketed on the right and Jiménez made tracks towards goal, he crossed to the unmarked Jota who brought the ball down, drew Etheridge and played it back for Jiménez to tuck the ball into the net.

Wolves were suddenly on the rampage, with Jiménez and Jota causing bedlam in and around the Cardiff box. It was almost three when Leander Dendoncker hit the post from a Gibbs-White corner, and when the ball broke loose his second attempt was somehow pushed over the bar by Etheridge.

After the break, Wolves had numerous chances to add to their lead, as Cardiff never looked like staging any kind of second-half comeback. Traore twice missed the target with efforts from outside the box, while Etheridge made save after save to deny Wolves the chance of boosting their goal difference figure.

Chelsea tried to strike back but the pattern was all too predictable as Wolves continued to block anything Chelsea could muster. Clearances and interceptions were made with apparent ease, and all of the back five were absolutely outstanding against the likes of Hazard, Pedro and Higuain.

However, with two of the four minutes of stoppage time already played Wolves hearts were broken. Hazard collected a short pass from Willian, and for the first time in the whole of the game was given



half a yard of space on the edge of the penalty area, and he curled the ball past Patricia into the bottom right-hand corner of the net.

With an FA Cup Quarter Final coming up next week against Manchester United at Molineux, let's hope that it's not the last time Wolves will play in London this season. A win will ensure a return to the capital in the form of an FA Cup Semi Final at Wembley, it's something we could have only dreamed of a few years ago, now nothing seems impossible for this majestic team.

WOLVES 2-1 MANCHESTER UNITED Saturday 16th March 2019 (FA Cup Quarter Final)



It was one of those special nights that Wolves fans will remember for a long time, the night that Nuno Espírito Santo's Boys reached the FA Cup semi-finals for the first time in 20 years. The mighty Manchester United came, and were conquered by a group of special players now donning the famous gold shirt.

After a goalless first-half, Wolves stepped up their intensity in the second-half with Raúl Jiménez and Diogo Jota grabbing the all-important goals, before Marcus Rashford grabbed a late consolation for United. Man United dominated possession in the early stages, but without hurting a resolute Wolves, and for all their control of territory their only chances were a shot that Pogba dragged wide, and an optimistic 30 yarder from Rashford that Ruddy easily dealt with.

It was around about the half-hour mark that Wolves started to up the tempo, Coady intercepted the ball in midfield and sprayed to Jonny, who then won a corner on the right. From that Moutinho picked out Neves on the edge of the box and his first-time effort was held by Romero.

Jota then latched on to Doherty's cross, but hit his volley into the ground, allowing Romero an easy save. And it was Jota who had best chance of either team just before the break. Wolves made a rapid counter attack after a poor United corner, and Neves threaded the ball through to Jota who broke towards goal, but Romero rushed off his line to block the shot.

It was déjà vu as United started the brighter at the start of the second-half, but as in the first-half didn't create any clear openings. Then in the 54th minute, a corner from the right found Jiménez who rose above Lindelof and powered a superb header towards the top corner, but Romero made a stunning one-handed save to tip the ball onto the crossbar and away for a corner.



The volume went up a several decibels as the crowd sensed that something special could be happening, and with 20 minutes left it did. The magical Moutinho attacked from the edge of the box and left three United defenders in his slipstream before passing to Jiménez, he somehow kept possession despite being surrounded, and with his back to goal he squeezed a low shot into the corner from 10 yards.

The roof came off and the noise was deafening, but six minutes later, just as the roof was returning to it's natural place Jota



had the Wolves fans blasting it off into the stratosphere again.

With United pressing for an equaliser, Wolves broke with lightning speed and Neves found the in-form Jota on the halfway line. He brushed aside a Shaw challenge, headed for the penalty area and struck a superb left foot shot past Romero to make it an unbelievable 2-0.

It was a cauldron of noise as Wolves went for the jugular, and United were lucky to escape further misery in the 81st minute when Lindelof was initially sent off for a foul on Jota, however VAR was used to switch the defender's punishment to just a booking.

Wolves' fans were already celebrating victory when Rashford pulled a goal back in injury time, but it mattered not, they were already on their way to Wemberlee. It was night that Wolves fans who were lucky enough to have a ticket, will never forget.

For the second time in just over a fortnight Wolves beat Manchester United 2-1 at Molineux. After going an early goal down many thought that Wolves may have had one eye on Sunday's date at Wembley. However, Nuno's Boys produced an exhilarating comeback to earn yet another unforgettable win in what has become a season to remember.

Molineux was again packed to the rafters with Wolves fans hoping to see a repeat of their quarter-final win just a couple of weeks earlier. If the first 20 minutes was anything to go by then they would have been prepared for disappointment, United attacked Wolves who defended too deep, allowing them to take the initiative.

United could have been out of sight in that opening period, Lukaku should have scored in the 5th minute but headed straight at Patricio from six yards out. The game continued to ebb and flow, and Dendoncker should have made it 2-1 but crashed it over from six yards after great work from Doherty. Then Lukaku was inches away when he fired inches past the post just before the break.

Young handed the initiative to Wolves on the hour mark when, having already been booked for a tugging Jota's shirt, he slid in recklessly on the Portuguese Maestro and caught him with a leg breaker of a challenge. It was an easy decision for referee Mike Dean to make as he took out his red card for the 100th time in the Premier League and waved it at Young.

Wolves' players could smell blood and went for the kill. The second goal was inevitable and it came in the 77th minute, although the manner was a bit farcical. Moutinho's cross caused mayhem and Jiménez prodded the ball towards goal,





Dendoncker attempted to make contact, and as Smalling challenged he fell to the ground and nudged the ball over the line with his hand.

As with the quarter-final the noise levels became deafening, and there was no taking the foot off the pedal for Nuno's Boys. De Gea produced a good save to prevent a second Smalling own goal, while Cavaleiro had time to hammer the ball against the crossbar before the referee eventually blew the final whistle.

Wolves now head to Wembley with their best chance of reaching the FA Cup Final for the first time since 1960 when they defeated Blackburn Rovers 3-0.

This will take some getting over, we could smell it and we could taste it, the first FA Cup final in 59 years was within our grasp. With just 12 minutes remaining we were 2-0 up, but somehow managed to throw the lead away. Watford pulled one back in the 79th minute, and with 180 seconds left they won a penalty when Dendoncker tripped Deeney inside the Wolves box, the striker picked himself up to blast in the spot-kick. In extra-time Deulofeu scored his second to make it 3-2 and break Wolves hearts. It was Dendoncker who had the first shot on target in the 32nd minute, his speculative 30 yard pile driver took a deflection and was tipped over by Gomes. However, Wolves went in front from the resulting corner. Doherty escaped the attention of Doucoure and the unmarked Irishman headed in Jota's cross to break the deadlock.



Wolves were on the up, and Watford could have fallen further behind when Jota ran from deep, easing past three defenders in a mazy run and then curling his shot a fraction wide, it would have been a worldie had it gone in. Wolves then had a real scare on the stroke of half-time, Watford should have levelled when Gray's goalbound effort cannoned off Coady's head and behind for a corner.

Wolves re-emerged after the break looking to build on their one-goal lead, and nearly made it 2-0 inside the first 30 seconds after the restart when Jiménez chased a ball over the top, held off his man and fired goalwards with Gomes having to palm it away.

Wolves seemed to have one foot into the final when they doubled their lead in the 62nd minute. Holebas brought down Jota for a Wolves free kick, and Doherty swung the ball over for Jiménez who chested the ball down and volleyed first-time past Gomes, a superb goal oozing quality.



With nothing to lose Watford piled pressure on the Wolves defence, but Ruddy remained untroubled until the 79th minute when Deulofeu, who earlier should have been sent off for thrusting his head into Moutinho's face, was left unmarked and curled it in from the left of the area to make it 2-1.

Suddenly Wolves were on the back foot, a succession of corners, crosses and long throws had them pinned deep into their own half. In the last few minutes Bennett replaced Neves, with Saiss pushing into midfield, and then Cavaleiro surprisingly came on for the outstanding Jota as Nuno sacrificed his best player.

Watford pushed, and pushed as Wolves defended deeper and deeper. Then in the 92nd minute, and with Wolves just 180 seconds from the final, Watford plunged a dagger into Wolves hearts. Dendoncker was adjudged to have tripped Deeney in the area, even though it looked a dive. Michael Oliver pointed to the spot, VAR agreed and Deeney stepped up to drive the ball past Ruddy and take the game into extra time.

Both sides struggled to maintain the intensity of a manic second half until Gray and Deulofeu exchanged passes on the break, and the latter held off Bennett to put Watford ahead for the first time.

Cavaleiro had Wolves' only real chance during the additional half-hour when beating Mariappa for pace and rounding Gomes. But with the goal at his mercy from a tight angle, the ball rebounded on his heel and away.

Wolves avenged their semi-final defeat by beating Watford 2-1 at Vicarage Road, and in the process strengthen their bid for a Europa Cup place. Chances were far and few between in the early stages but the game suddenly came alive on the half-hour mark when Jiménez went close to scoring.

Following a lightning quick counter-attack Jota fed Doherty who was overlapping down the right side of the area, and his pinpoint cross across the six-yard box created the opening for Jiménez, but he was denied by Capoue with a last-ditch goal-line clearance. Goal-line technology confirmed that the whole of the ball did not cross all of the line.

However, Wolves did take the lead four minutes before the break, a right-wing corner eventually found its way through to Jota waiting unmarked on the left edge of the box. His inch perfect cross to the far post was met by Jiménez who headed home from virtually on the goal line.

After getting their noses in front Wolves threw away the lead within four minutes of the restart. Bennett attempted to pass the ball back to Patricio and did not see Deulofeu behind him, the keeper smothered the strikers shot, but the ball fell straight to Gray who thumped it into the unguarded net.

With 20 minutes remaining it was on a knife edge with both sides going for the win. Coady threw himself at the ball to block a Hughes shot, while a Moutinho screamer from range was deflected just over the bar. However, with 12 minutes left Wolves struck the killer blow, Neves swung over a cross from deep to the back post where a flapping Foster missed the ball and Jota guided a first time volley into the net.



Patricio's goal wasn't seriously troubled in the closing stages or five minutes of stoppages time, with the Wolves defence organised and calm. Jota was denied a stone wall penalty when taken out by Kabasele late on, but fortunately it didn't matter with Wolves seeing out time and strengthening their hold on 7th place.

Wolves finished on a high in their last home game of the season with a comfortable win over Championship bound Fulham. Leander Dendoncker's late strike sealed a 1-0 win. After a quiet first half the visitors penalty area became a war zone with Jota, Jiménez and co laying siege on the Fulham goal.

For whatever reason, Wolves have struggled against teams in the bottom half of the table this season, in stark contrast to their impressive form against the top-six sides, and it was no different in the first half of this clash. Wolves dominated both possession and territory before the break, but without really testing Fulham goalkeeper Sergio Rico.

A brilliant move involving Moutinho, Jiménez and Jota in the 11th minute nearly led to the opener, Moutinho played beyond the back-line to Jiménez, a gorgeous back heel by the Mexican gave Jota a shot on goal from the edge of the area. However Rico was there to make an excellent fingertip stop at the expense of a corner.

A few minutes later Fulham were caught in possession on the edge of their own box, allowing Jota a clear run on goal, but from a tight angle the forward flashed a shot inches past the far post.

The closest Wolves actually came to making a first-half breakthrough was on the half-hour mark when they worked a left-wing corner short to Moutinho. However, Dendoncker was only able to head the Portuguese Maestro's inviting cross against the bar from six yards out.

In a rare foray into Wolves territory Fulham should have opened the scoring in the 63rd minute, Sessegnon broke down the right flank and cut the ball back perfectly for the unmarked Mitrovic some 10 yards from goal, but the Serb sent his shot high over the bar.

Wolves hit back with three chances inside two minutes. A Neves thunderbolt from outside the box was tipped wide by Rico, before the keeper saved Doherty's goalbound header with his legs. Moutinho had crossed to Doherty for that chance, and from his resulting corner Jiménez flashed a header past the post.

Wolves continued to press and in the 73rd minute a free kick was taken short to Jonny, his shot from the edge of the box fell nicely at Doherty's feet, but despite the Irishman smashing the ball into the roof of the net the goal was ruled out for offside.

Nuno's Boys finally broke the deadlock with 15 minutes left on the clock. Fulham gave the ball away to Doherty who played a neat one-two with Moutinho down the right flank, and from the wing back's inchperfect pull back there was Dendoncker to cushion a brilliant volley past a helpless Rico at his near post. Wolves piled forward in search of a second with Jota doing everything bar finding the net. His rasping half-volley was tipped onto the bar by Rico in what turned out to be the last goalscoring chance. There was just about time for Will Norris and Max Kilman to get onto the field before the full-time whistle blew and Wolves' wonderful home season drew to a close.
